Durham Invites Public Art Submissions for Neighborhood Park Murals

May 16 Submission Deadline

DURHAM, N.C. – Local and regional artists are invited to <u>apply for a new public art project</u> to be displayed at four City of Durham-owned parks.

The City of Durham General Services Department, Durham Parks and Recreation, Office of Economic and Workforce Development, and the Durham Cultural Advisory Board's Public Art Committee invite qualified North Carolina artists or artist teams to submit qualifications to design, fabricate, and install mural or ground plane public art at Garrett Road Park, Sherwood Park, Solite Park, and Whippoorwill Park.

These four new locations are an extension of the Neighborhood Park Mural Project pilot initiative launched in spring 2017 at Southern Boundaries Park. At that location, Durham artists Julia Gartrell and Julienne Alexander created a mural on the exterior walls of the park's newly renovated bathroom facility. Gartrell and Alexander held two photo shoots with local residents to obtain silhouettes in action. After the photographs were taken, they projected and painted the images on the facility walls to complete the mural.

Now, this initiative is extending to Garrett Road Park, Sherwood Park, Solite Park, and Whipoorwill Park. Public art at these locations should promote activity, creativity, playfulness, and relevance to the specific park location. The City will give preference to artists/artist teams whose proposals incorporate community engagement. Application materials include: statement of interest, annotated samples of previous work relevant to project, project personnel resume(s), and references. The deadline for submissions is May 16, 2018. North Carolina residents over the age of 18 are eligible to submit to the call for art.
