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Enlightening and Empowering Residents to Build a Better Durham

Durham Neighborhood College offers a unique opportunity for Durham residents to learn about the organization, operations and services of their local government. Jointly sponsored by Durham City and County governments, the program consists of interactive sessions facilitated by various local government officials. A wealth of information is provided to empower participants to play a more active role in their neighborhoods and the Durham community.



Schedule & Curriculum

Durham Neighborhood College offers an annual nine week session that runs from September through October. Classes are held weekly from 6 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. in City and County facilities. A light dinner is served. The curriculum includes the following topics:

- Introduction to City and County Services
- Neighborhoods
- Public Safety – Durham Police Department and the Office of the Sheriff
- Emergency Services
- Health and Human Services
- Community and Workforce Development
- Environment
- Budget and Finance
- Graduation Ceremonies



Eligibility Criteria - To be considered, an applicant must be:

- A resident of Durham (City or County)
- Current in payment of vehicle and property taxes (at the time of application)
- Committed to attend the nine sessions.

Cost - There is a \$30 fee for participants selected. A limited number of scholarships are available.

Selection Process - Space is limited to 30 participants. Applications will be selected to create a diverse participant population from as many Durham neighborhoods as possible. Applicants who are not selected for a particular session will be put on a waiting list with weighted consideration for future sessions.

How to Apply - During the recruitment period, applications are available at the Durham County Clerk to the Board of Commissioners, 200 East Main Street, second floor. Applications can also be completed online or downloaded from the City's website at www.durhamnc.gov or the County website at www.dconc.gov.
